Mno-tasewan (Happy Halloween)

Ever wonder where Halloween came from and all the trick or treating, jack o lanterns, and costumes? I know I find it interesting learning something new! The roots of this holiday come from the ancient Celtic festival of Samhain "SAH-win". A Pagan celebration to welcome the harvest at the end of the summer; people would light bonfires and wear costumes to ward off ghosts. In the eight century Pope Gregory III dubbed November 1 as All Saints Day. The evening before All Saints Day, was known as All Hallows Eve, only to be later called Halloween.

The jack o' lanterns used to be made out of turnips. They were originally used to try and frighten off evil spirits by carving scary faces into them. The costumes were used in the same fashion, believed to ward off evil spirits, not to have them mistaken for spirits themselves and left

alone.

Trick or treating has three theories: 1) During Samhain people would leave food out to feed the spirits traveling the Earth at night. Eventually people started dressing up as the spirits in exchange for similar offerings with food and drink. 2) During the Middle Ages, poor adults and children would collect food and money from local homes in return for prayers

on All Soul's Day. 3)

"Belsnickeling" is a German American Christmas tradition where children dress up in costume and the adults would have to quess the identities of the disguised. If nobody could guess correct they would win food or treats.

Pretty neat to realize how far Halloween has gone back and to see how far we have come since those days!
