History of Mt. Pleasant Indian Industrial Boarding School

To fulfill part of the 1855 Treaty with the Anishinabek in Michigan, the United States Congress established the Mt. Pleasant Indian Industrial Boarding School (MIIBS). Anishinabe Three Fires Confederacy lands were taken, and in exchange government officials promised to provide an education to all American Indian children. The 1855 Treaty became the basis for the 1934 Comstock Act legislation which pays for the college education of American Indians in Michigan. Today, it is known as the Michigan Indian Tuition Waiver.

The Mt. Pleasant Indian Industrial Boarding School consisted of 37 buildings on 320 acres of land, with an average enrollment of 300 American Indian students per year in grades K-8. The school operated from 1893 to 1934. Daily life was very regimented. Like other American Indian Boarding Schools, students were forbidden to speak their language, honor their culture, and practice their spirituality. The students performed work such as laundry, farm work, cleaning, and other manual labor for the majority of the school day. They also received basic academic instruction for the remainder of the day.

State of Michigan Land Conveyance

Public Act 208 was signed into law by Governor Granholm and became effective on October 25, 2010. The act authorized conveyance of a tract of land (the former Mt. Pleasant Indian Industrial Boarding School campus) to the City of Mt. Pleasant and Saginaw Chippewa Indian Tribe of Michigan. For \$1 each the City was offered 311.14 acres and the Tribe was offered 8.86 acres, which included six historic boarding school buildings and the Mission Creek Cemetery. The City and the Tribe were given 180 days to render a decision on whether to accept or reject the conveyances.

The Saginaw Chippewa Tribal Council launched a community-based participatory feasibility study on January 29, 2011 to address Public Act 208. Tribal Council charged an Advisory Group of internal experts to rigorously assess community interest and identify key factors to consider in order to provide the Tribal Council with enough relevant information to guide their final decision.

On Wednesday, April 22, the Saginaw Chippewa Tribal Council voted to accept the land conveyance. The official \$1 deed transfer from the State of Michigan to Tribal Chief Dennis Kequom took place Monday, April 25, 2011 at the Ziibiwing Center of Anishinabe Culture & Lifeways.

The former MIIBS Advisory Group became a sanctioned committee by Tribal Council in October 2011 and continues to meet regularly at the Ziibiwing Center.
