

Dr. Michael Migizi Sullivan is an Anishinaabe (Ojibwe) linguist from the Lac Courte Oreilles Ojibwe reservation in northern Wisconsin. He serves as the resident linguist for the Waadookodaading Ojibwe Language Immersion School where he contributes to immersion teacher training, proficiency development and instruction, Ojibwe language arts instruction. He is a firm believer in an Anishinaabe-centric self-determined pedagogy grounded in Anishinaabe language, worldview, and spiritual lifestyle. Sullivan currently resides with his family in the Skunawong community on the Lac Courte Oreilles reservation where he enjoys the outdoors. He and his children enjoy singing at powwows, round dances, and ceremonies.



Barbara Nolan Barb resides in Garden River Ontario. She is an Ojibwe language specialist. "Like many indigenous communities around the world today, we Nishnaabe people are currently in the midst of an inspiring period of healing and nation-building. Dylan Bizhikiins Jennings is a member of the Marten clan. He served two terms on Tribal Council for the Bad River Tribe. Bizhikiins graduated from the University of Wisconsin Madison with degrees in Anthropology, Archaeology, Environmental Studies, and American Indian Studies and is completing his Masters degree. He resides in Odanah, and works as the Director of Public Information for the Great Lakes Indian Fish & Wildlife Commission. His presentations are on topics that range from traditional subsistence, sovereignty, tribal environmental perspective, cultural immersion, Ojibwemowin, Tribal Historic Preservation, food sovereignty, Ojibwe curriculum, and cultural identity.
