# Why do I need to check my septic tank if it isn't causing problems?

Imagine someone who is trying to sell you a car said, "It runs great! It has 230,000 miles on it and I've never even had to change the oil!" It is safe to assume this car has or will definitely have problems.

This analogy is similar for your home septic system because it is not always apparent when a septic system is not functioning properly, so it is crucial to keep up with regular inspections and maintenance.

According to the United States Environmental Protection Agency, septic tanks should be pumped and inspected every 1-3 years.

# Impact to local waterways and your health.

- Beach/river/boat launch closings due to Escherichia coli (*E. coli*) levels.
- E. coli is an indicator species used to test for fecal contamination.
- Fecal contamination carries dangerous pathogens that can harm human health and even cause death.
  - Symptoms of exposure can be flu-like.
  - Bacteria can infect wounds.
- Much of the input is due to residential and commercial absence of or failing septic systems.


