Employee Appreciation Banquet

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Chief Theresa Peters-Jackson and Tribal Council share State of the Tribe message

More than 300 Tribal Members from districts one, two and three came to the Soaring Eagle Casino & Resort's Entertainment Hall on Jan. 21 to hear Chief Theresa Peters-Jackson and Tribal Council share their 2023 State of the Tribe messages.

The doors opened at 9 a.m. and the Membership had an opportunity to interact with 27 Tribal departments and organizations that offered updates on services available.

New to the community meeting this year was a "Tribal vendor" area where four businesses were able to promote and sell items at their booths.

Erik Rodriguez, public relations director, served as emcee for the meeting and the Anishinaabe Ogitchedaw Veteran Warrior Society (AOVWS) brought the eagle staffs and flags in during a grand entry and flag song offered by the Onion Creek Singers.

Tribal Council Chaplain Alice Jo Ricketts offered a blessing in Ojibwe and prayed

for the meal. Ricketts also led the community in observing a moment of silence for the loved ones we lost over the last year.

Chris Nadobny, food and beverage director for Soaring Eagle, and his staff prepared a buffet breakfast for the Membership while a community slide show played in the background along with announcements of upcoming community events.

The chief thanked everyone who attended in person

and who was watching on the live webcast. She informed the Membership that the material shared at the community meeting will be available along with the legislative reports from the Lansing-based Public Affairs Associates and the Washington, D.C.-based Spirit Rock Consulting.

The chief also reviewed the Council meeting request form that is available online and mentioned it is to help the Membership resolve any conflicts regarding the timely access of Tribal services. She also provided an update of water and wastewater funding and mentioned this year is the 50th anniversary of the SCIT logo created by her father Julius Peters in 1973.

Sub-Chief Jennifer Wassegijig provided an overview of Tribal Member healthcare and Council Secretary Martha Wemigwans provided an update on Anishinaabe Garden products that are now available at Migizi retail properties.

Tribal Council Treasurer Gayle Ruhl gave a demonstration to the Membership

on how to access the Tribal Member page along with an update on SCIT involvement with the National Congress of American Indians (the Tribe has been members of the national advocacy organization since October 1997).

Frank Cloutier, district three council member, discussed a SCIT general welfare opportunity for Members and Council Member Luke Sprague spoke about the Nimkee Fitness program changing to a 24-hour, seven days a week facility.

Sgt.-at-Arms David Merrill Jr. shared a traditional teaching regarding unity and welcoming the Membership to become involved in this year's upcoming events.

Youth Council approached the podium and introduced themselves, followed by a Saginaw Chippewa Tribal College update from SCTC President Carla Sineway.

Migizi CEO Bob Juckniess provided an overview regarding Migizi business properties and SECR CEO Melinda Coffin provided an update regarding the Saginaw Chippewa gaming enterprises.

Tribal Council Treasurer Gayle Ruhl returned to deliver a PowerPoint presentation to report how the Tribe has performed over the last six months (her treasurer's report is available in its entirety on the Membership portion of the Tribal website).

The event concluded with door prize and 50/50 drawings, and the AOVWS retired the staff and flags with a traveling song from Onion Creek Singers.


Jackson administration continues to show their commitment with expansion and growth."

The Saginaw Chippewa Housing Department is offering rental assistance to Native American college students that meet the following criteria:

- 18 years old or older and financially independent of their parents
- Must be a duly enrolled member of any Native Tribe that has been identified on the most current Federal Register listing of "Indian Entities Recognized by and Eligible to Receive Services from the U.S. BIA (86 FR 7554 (Jan. 29, 2021))"
- Household is low-income as determined by HUD's definition: <https://www.huduser.gov/portal/datasets/il.html>
- Enrolled in an accredited post-secondary college or university pursuing a 2 year (or higher) degree or certificate
- The university or college and the rental unit must be located within the Lower Peninsula of the state of Michigan

Isabelle Osawamick, Anishinaabe outreach specialist and Wikwemikong First Nations elder, offered a traditional blessing for the gathering and food in Ojibwe.

“It’s awesome to see the response from babies when I talked to them in Anishinaabemowin,” said Osawamick. “It looks like they understood what I said to them, because when I told them in our language that they are cute, pretty and I love them, they cooed back to me and smiled back. Mom’s laughed when they saw their babies’ reaction. I too was amazed. Talk about blood memory!”

Osawamick realized the first winter storm of the year may have affected the turnout with an estimated 75 in attendance, but she could feel the warmth and good spirits present.

“It was great to see many babies celebrated with their extended families in attendance; siblings, aunties, uncles, grandmas, grandpas and even some

great-grandparents,” Osawamick said. “I loved it when some babies had Anishinaabe names as their dominant name rather than the common name...”

Jasmine Gonzalez, Nimkee community health representative, assisted at the registration table with support from Melissa Bailey, maternal child health nurse for Nimkee.

“I was so excited to be included in the Baby Celebration this year,” Gonzalez said. “Being able to welcome all of the new babies in the community felt like such an honor to a part of it all. I can’t wait for the next one!”

Three youth cousins set to compete in North American Indigenous Games

The youth are the future and they continue to amaze us with what they're capable of. Three Tribal youth and cousins — Kenneth Wemigwans, 17; Joshua Wemigwans, 17; and James Hendrickson, 16 — will be competing in the North American Indigenous Games 2023 held in Nova Scotia, Canada in July.

All three young men will be competing in basketball in the 10th North American Indigenous Games (NAIG), which will bring together more than 5,000 athletes, coaches and team staff from more than 756 Indigenous Nations.

NAIG will be held July 15-23 and will host competitions in 16 sports within 21 venues across Kijipuktuk (Halifax), Dartmouth, Millbrook First Nation (naig2023.com).

Kenneth Wemigwans, a senior at Mt. Pleasant High

School, said tryouts were held in Suttons Bay, Mich. in November. The day consisted of waking up early, leaving at 5 a.m. and driving in a winter storm, and participating in a variety of basketball drills for four hours.

The boys said they were excited when they heard the news they made the cut.

"My mom (Heaven Wemigwans) woke me up for school; she told me when we were getting ready and was pretty excited," Kenneth Wemigwans said.

They each agreed the support from their family helped set them up for success.

"We couldn't have done this without our family by our side supporting us," said James Hendrickson, a 10th grader at the Oasis Way Program.

They each wished to thank their family, particularly each of their parents; their grandma and grandpa; and uncles Trey, Brian and Henry, who helped

them discover their passion for basketball.

All three have been playing the sport since elementary school and are looking forward to representing their Tribe — and state — at NAIG.

"I think it's awesome that we're going to go and represent our tribe. It's an awesome feeling," said Joshua Wemigwans, a junior at Mt. Pleasant High School.

"It's a great opportunity to be given the chance to play on a bigger scale," Kenneth Wemigwans said.

The cousins are paving the way for other SCIT youth who hope to pursue their greatest passions.

The families will be hosting upcoming fundraisers for the travel and competition costs. It is in the works to have a spaghetti dinner and a "Find the Joker" fundraiser.

Joshua's mother, Jacqueline Wemigwans, said she is eager to acknowledge their devotion to the sport.

"Throughout the years, as little kids, I would hear them talking about how they're going to be in the NBA and this is a stepping stone for their careers," Jacqueline Wemigwans said. "I always want to be there to encourage them... I tell them, 'as long as you're doing something positive, Mom is here to support you.'"

James' mother, Tribal Council Secretary Martha Wemigwans, was the one to discover tryouts were being held and passed along the information to the boys.

Hendrickson said they are looking forward to "competing against other tribes and seeing what they can do."

NAIG will have athletes competing in 16 different sports with three traditional Indigenous sports including canoe/kayak, lacrosse, and 3D archery (naig2023.com).

The games are hosted on the homeland of the Mi'kmaq People. In Nova Scotia, Mi'kmaq are divided into 13 bands. Like the SCIT, each band is led by an elected chief and council.


Next up was the soft, smooth melody of "Gentle On My Mind" followed by the boisterous, whimsical hit "That's My Story."

Saving the best for last, Raye ended his set with "Love Remains," followed by the No. 1 hits "My Kinda Girl" and "Love, Me."




