Saginaw Chippewa Tribal Court implements new security measures starting Sept. 18

By a 10-0 approved Tribal Council motion dated May 31, 2023, the Saginaw Chippewa Tribal Court will implement new security measures beginning Sept. 18.

During the screening process, all persons, their belongings and all hand carried items are subject to screening by Tribal Court security officers/ Tribal Police upon entry for the purpose of keeping prohibited

items out of the court facility. This includes, but is not limited to, the use of a metal detector, X-ray machine, magnetometer, hand wand devices, a physical pat down/frisk and/ or visual inspection.

Also during the screening process, all persons shall empty their pockets of all contents and remove belts, jackets, watches or metallic jewelry and shoes, if requested by Tribal Court.

In addition, all bags, boxes, briefcases, purses and containers brought into the courthouse are subject to a scan through metal detectors or X-ray machine. If a metal detector or x-ray machine is not available, Tribal Court security officers/Tribal Police shall conduct physical and visual inspections (hand search) of the contents of all bags, boxes, briefcases, purses and containers.

If at any time there is a articulable suspicion that a weapon or other impermissible item may be found, a person or object may be a subsearch shall be no more intrusive than necessary to protect against the dangers presented.

Individuals with an internal medical device, using a wheelchair, or who otherwise cannot be screened by a metal detector may be screened by a pat down or a hand wand device.

Further measures include any person in possession of a prohibited item or impaired by alcohol or a controlled substance shall be denied entrance to the court facility.

If the Tribal Court secuject to additional search. The rity officer is unavailable,

the main courthouse entry doors will be locked and entry will be made at the Tribal Police Department (6954 East Broadway, Mt. Pleasant) main entry door. The same procedures for screening will occur at the alternate entrance.

Compliance with the new security policy is mandatory. Failure to follow policy requirements may result in denial of entry into, or removal from, the courthouse, confiscation of property, contempt of court proceedings, or other sanctions by the judge.

Rain and clouds break as sun shines through recovery at annual Freedom Walk

The rain and clouds took a break as sun shined through stories of recovery at the 34th annual Freedom Walk during the Saginaw Chippewa Powwow weekend Saturday, July 29.

Behavioral Health Director Ame Edstrom said the event had close to 220 people participate and was one of the largest Freedom Walk events to date.



"It is wonderful to see so many people invested and engaged in walking to promote recovery/sobriety and in walking for our loved ones who have passed," Edstrom said.

Chief Theresa Peters-Jackson gave opening remarks and encouraged everyone to continue their support of those seeking to "walk the good path of recovery."

Sub-Chief Jennifer Wassegijig offered prayers to bless the meal (prepared by Sam Anglin, permanent supportive housing manager) and gave a heartfelt tribute to her late husband, Allan Wassegijig.

"My husband walked to the Lord on Dec. 23, 2017, but today is when we get a chance to walk for those loved ones who we have lost and meant so much to us," Wassegijig said. "His memories of being a loving husband and father will not be forgotten and we can share those stories of how addiction has affected our communities. Allan encouraged others while fighting the battle of addiction and we had many good times together. He would certainly be encouraging others to continue and

stay on the walk of recovery." The Ziibiwing Center and Bonnie Ekdahl assisted in researching and discovered the first Freedom Walk was held in 1989. Ekdahl shared the Council resolution signed by Chief Arnold Sowmick in 1988



Deer Season 2023

Per Tribal Ordinance 11, Section 105 subdivision 6(B) the 20231 Deer Season shall begin Sept. 4, 2023, and will close on Feb. 1, 2024 unless ordered otherwise.

Further restrictions shall be as follows:

- Sept. 4, 2023 Oct. 31, 2023 shall be bow only on all designated Tribal Trust and Tribal Fee Lands.
- Nov. 1, 2023 Feb. 1, 2024 shall be gow or gun on all designated Tribal Trust and Tribal Fee Lands

The 2023 Deer Season will allow for the harvest of five deer as follows:

- Three antlerless* Antlerless gives the ability to take an anterless deer or a deer with antlers less than three inches in length (Ordinance 11, Section 103, Subdivision 2)
- One restricted (restricted to four or more one inch minimum points on one side)
- One antlered (any size antlered)

Licenses and harvest tags will be available starting Aug. 29, 2023, at the Tribal Planning Department office at \$10 per harvest tag. Only five tags are allowed.

• "Other Indians" may not hunt on Tribal Trust or Tribal owned Fee Land. Other Indians as defined in Tribal Ordinance 11, Section 104 subdivision 52.

Per Tribal Ordinance 11, Section 105, Subdivision 5(B). Animal harvest must be reported within 72 hours of take by phone, email or online.

- Please Refer to the Ordinance 11 on the Saginaw Chippewa Indian Tribe website for rules and regulations.
- Hunter orange is in accordance with Tribal Ordinance 11, Section 104 subdivision 5 and harvest reporting is to be in accordance with Tribal Ordinance 11, Section 105, Subdivision 5(B)
- Tribal lands designated for hunting are approved by the map located at the Tribe's Planning Department.

Tree stands/blinds are only permitted on Tribal property one week before the start of deer season as stated above and must be removed one week after deer season close date as stated above; remaining items will be confiscated. No screw-in tree steps, spikes, etc. are permitted except bow/gun hooks. Tree stands/blinds must have name and address affixed in a visible area, or they will be subject to confiscation.

The 2023/2024 Migratory Bird Season will allow for the bag limit as listed. Non toxic shot only.

Migratory bird season daily bag limit:

- Ducks: 20*
- Canada Geese: 20**
- Mergansers: 10***
- Woodcock: 10
- Common Snipe: 16
- Mourning Dove: 25
- Coots & Gallinules: 20 Sandhill Cranes: 1
- Sora and Virgina Rails: 20
- * Ducks 20 per day, including no more than five each of the following species: hen mallard, wood duck, redhead, scaup, black duck, pintail and canvasback. Possession *limit is not to exceed two times the bag limit.*
- ** 20 per day Canada Geese aggregate. Coot, gallinule, sora and Virginia rail is 20 in the aggregate.
- ***No more than 5 hooded mergansers in the aggregate.

Reporting within 72 hours of harvest is mandatory per Tribal Ordinance 11, Section 109, Subdivision 5(B). A small game license is also required as per Tribal

Ordinance 11, Section 109, Subdivision 2. Licenses and harvest tags will be available

starting Aug. 29, 2023 at the Tribal Planning Department office. Fee is \$10 per license.

Small Game Season 2023

Per Tribal Ordinance 11, Section 106 subdivision 3 the 2023 Small Game Season shall begin Friday, Sept. 1, 2023, and will close on Friday, March 31, 2024, unless ordered otherwise.

The 2023 Small Game Season will allow for the bag limits as listed:

- Pheasants shall be limited to male pheasants only with a limit of five per day.
- Badger, beaver, muskrat, mink, pine martin, fisher and otter are all closed to small game hunting.
- Badger, beaver, muskrat, mink and otter will be open for Trapping Season. Bag limits per Trapping Season Order.
- Bobcat is limited to two tags only whether hunting, trapping or combination of seasons.

Small game species are defined in Tribal Ordinance 11, Section 103 subdivision 66.

Licenses will be available starting Aug. 29, 2023, at the Tribal Planning Department office.

Animal harvest must be reported within 72 hours of take by phone, email, or online.

- "Other Indians" may not hunt on Tribal Trust or Tribal owned Fee Land. Other Indians as defined in Tribal Ordinance 11, Section 104 subdivision 52.
- Please Refer to the Ordinance 11 on the Saginaw Chippewa Indian Tribe website for rules and regulations.

Special Elder and Mentored **Youth Deer Hunt 2023**

Saginaw Chippewa Indian Tribe

Per Tribal Ordinance 11, Section 105 subdivision 6(B) the 2023 Special Elder and Mentored Youth Deer Hunt shall begin Sept. 1, 2023 and will close on Sept. 3, 2023, unless ordered otherwise. Further restrictions shall be as follows:

- Tribal Member Youth for the purpose of this hunt are defined as ages 10 years to 17 years of age.
- Youth Participants ages 14-17 must be accompanied by a Tribally Licensed Adult Mentor at least 21 years of age under Tribal Ordinance 11.
- Youth Participants ages 10 up to 14 must be accompanied by a Tribal Licensed Parent or Guardian.
- Persuant to Ordinance 11, Section 105, Subdivision 2(B): under 14 years of age must be accompanied by a licensed parent or guardian.
- The mentor is not allowed to carry any hunting device (firearm, bow or crossbow) in the field while accompanying the youth hunter.
- Ages 10 years to under 14 years are only eligible to use a bow for this hunt.
- Ages 14 years to 17 years are eligible to use a bow or firearm for this hunt.
- Tribal Elders for the purposes of this hunt is defined as 50 years of age or older.
- The license for this hunt may not be assigned to a proxy hunter.

The 2023 Special Elder and Mentored Youth Hunt will allow for the harvest of one deer. Licenses and harvest tags will be available starting Aug. 29, 2023, at the Tribal Planning Department office at \$10 per harvest tag. Only one tag is allowed for this special hunt. Per Tribal Ordinance 11, Section 105, Subdivision 5(B). Animal harvest must be reported within 72 hours of take by phone, email or online.

- All other portions of Tribal Ordinance 11 must still be followed.
- Please Refer to the Ordinance 11 on the Saginaw Chippewa Indian Tribe website for rules and regulations.
- Hunter orange is in accordance with Tribal Ordinance 11, Section 104 subdivision 5 and harvest reporting is to be in accordance with Tribal Ordinance 11, Section 105, Subdivision 5(B)

Tribal voting 500-foot radius, non-interference zone

The Tribal voting 500-foot radius, non-interference zone:

Ordinance 4, section 19. Prohibition against interference with Elections.

On Election Day for any Council election, including any Primary, General, Special, Run-Off or removal Election, a person, including any Tribal official, employee or representative, shall not:

(a) On any land owned by the Tribe or held in trust for the Tribe, excluding property leased for residential use:

(i) post, display or distribute any material that directly or indirectly makes reference to an election, a candidate or a ballot question (This subsection does not apply to official material that is required by law to be posted, displayed or distributed in a polling place on election day);

(ii) solicit, persuade or endeavor to persuade, intimidate or threaten a person to vote for or against any particular candidate or for or against any ballot question that is being voted on at the election; or

(iii) either directly or indirectly, for the person's own benefit or on behalf of any other person, receive, agree or contract for valuable consideration for voting or agreeing to vote, or inducing or attempting to induce another to vote, or for refraining or agreeing to refrain, or inducing or attempting to induce another to refrain, from vot-

(iv) either directly or indirectly, give, lend or promise valuable consideration to or for any person as an inducement to influence



the manner of voting by a person relative to a candidate or ballot question or as a reward for refraining from voting; or

(b) loiter within a building where a polling place is located or within 500 feet of any entrance to such building, including any parking areas adjacent or appurtenant to such building; or

(c) directly or indirectly utter or address any threat or intimidation to an election official or other person authorized to administer or enforce election laws or to conduct, oversee or monitor an election or to assist in the carrying out of such duties, with the intent to induce such person to do any act not authorized by law or to refrain or delay in the performance of any duty imposed by law.



There must have been that policy that you have to be in your position for six months to transfer, because after six months, he transferred directly to security and that's been his home ever since. David was part of the opening of the Saganing Eagles Landing Casino.

When asked what his proudest moment from working at Saganing is, David said when he responded to a medical emergency. A guest was unconscious with no pulse. David administered chest compressions and was able to revive the guest. The guest's family was beyond grateful as they watched David essentially save his life. This quick reaction received recognition from MMR and the Arenac Independent.

Security Director Michael Peruski shared the following about Hooper:

When we opened SELC in 2007, we realized with our remote location, if there were a medical emergency, MMR could take anywhere from 12-25 minutes. So the security director and supervisors became Medical First Responders.

We were grateful to have David, who was seasoned with his EMT license. David would lead the medical calls because he had over a decade of experience being an EMT.

Under David's lead on medicals, he has taught other team members how to care for guests in need of medical attention. He has a very fast and responsive treatment. SELC has the highest survival rate during cardiac incidents outside a hospital setting in Northern Michigan per MMR and David is one of the biggest reasons.

It is not uncommon for David to share his culture with us by wearing his kilt on his anniversary. His heart, dedication and fine sense of humor has led to a lot of friendships with all of us. We don't know what things would have looked like without him.

Edward Pfund, slot operations director, was honored for reaching 25 years of service. Bruner shared the following about Pfund:

Ed started his career in 1997 with Soaring Eagle Casino & Resort as a slot attendant. In 2002, he



Caillat began with her hit songs "Fallin' for You," "Realize" and "I Never Told You."




