

Mary travels the globe with The Indigenous Grandmothers of the Sacred We, presenting on issues including foster care of indigenous children and supporting women in recovery from addiction. She is the founder of the Minnesota Coalition on Fetal Alcohol Syndrome (MNCOFAS@aol.com), an Indian Child Welfare Act Expert Witness and Native American Family and Child Advocate for the Tribes. Mary was a keynote speaker at the Parliament of World Religions in Utah and spoke at the 2014 World Climate March in New York City. She is a winner of the Minnesota Congressional Angels in Adoption Award, nominated by Senator Norm Coleman from Minnesota. She currently serves as a counselor for the women's sobriety group Women of Wellbriety International.

For over 30 years, Mary has fostered and adopted many children with disabilities and fetal alcohol syndrome. She was one of the many Native American children removed from her home and placed in an institution. Mary explains alcohol as a coping mechanism turned to by some from her generation.

Documenting the lives of western Native American peoples, the stunning portraits and landscapes of **The North America Indian**, which were created from 1907 through 1930, are considered to be both the greatest artistic collaboration and photographic achievement in history.

The Muskegon Museum owns a complete edition, identified as the 70th of the planned original sets, of **The North American Indian, by Edward S. Curtis,** internationally recognized as the most comprehensive ethnographic and photographic historical record of Native Americans ever produced.

The astounding work is comprised of twenty volumes of research (containing 2.5 million works of text and thousands of photographs) and 20 portfolios containing an additional 723 photogravures.
