On Thursday, April 4 through Sunday, April 7, 2019, Ziibiwing welcomed Indiana University Purdue University Indianapolis for a 4-day collaborative project entitled "Community Collaboration & Curation." The first day of the event began with a continental breakfast, smudge and prayer, continued with tours of the Ziibiwing Center and permanent exhibit, and then proceeded to the Ziibiwing work projects on the agenda.

During their time at Ziibiwing the group of students, their attending professor, Dr. Holly Cusack-McVeigh and the Ziibiwing staff shared first-hand many of the facets and details involved with museum curation in a spirit of education, community assistance, camaraderie and fun!

Last year this event occurred with many of the students returning again this year. The students were involved in a range of activities that included dusting and cleaning the permanent exhibit displays, preparing a space of honor in the Grand Entry Lobby for the community-built wiigwaasi-jiiman, helping with the initial set up for the upcoming changing exhibit, WIINDANOKIINDIWAG, creating a gift bundle for the community of things they brought to share, for example children's books, that they presented to the Tribal Council, visiting the Mt. Pleasant Indian Industrial Boarding School campus and Mission Creek Cemetery, cleaning a bear pelt and late 19th Century beadwork, learning about archive handling, receiving an Anishinaabemowin language lesson from Howard Webkamigad, Director of SCIT's Anishinaabe Language Revitalization Department, and enjoying both a welcome dinner with Ziibiwing Director, Shannon Martin, and a Backyard Cook-Out on the Ziibiwing patio with Ziibiwing staff.

The University group also had wonderful gifts for some of the staff including a pouch decorated with quills for Visitor Services Representative, "Mr. Ray" (Raymond Cadotte), who taught them about the hand drum using the traditional song "Old MacDonald" (IoI), and gave a presentation of all the other items in the Culture Kit. Onaubinisay (Walks Above the Ground), Elder Jim Dumont, (Ojibway -Anishinabe of the Marten Clan - originally from the Shawanaga First Nation on Eastern Georgian Bay) is the Chief of the Eastern Doorway of the Three Fires Midewiwin Lodge. He was a professor of Native Studies at the University of Sudbury of Laurentian University of Sudbury of Laurentian University of 25 wears and is one University of Sudbury of Laurentian Jiniversity for 25 years and is one of the founders of its Native Studies Department. During his tenure, Jim reated and taught courses in Tradition and Culture, Native Psychology, Native Way of Seeing, Native Education, and ssues of Indigenous Peoples in the International Context.

Tara Zhaabowekwe Houska (Couchiching First Nation Anishinaabe) is a tribal attorney, the National Campaigns Director of Honor the

Campaigns Director of Honor the Earth, and a former advisor on Native American affairs to Bernie Sanders. She advocates on behalf of tribal nations at the local, state, federal and international levels on a wide range of issues impacting indigenous peoples. Tara spent six months on the frontlines in North Dakota fighting the Dakota Access Pipeline, and is heavily engaged in the movement to defund

engaged in the movement to defund ossil fuels and a years-long struggle against Enbridge's Line 3 pipeline.





Peter Annin, Director of the Mary Griggs Burke Center for Freshwater Innovation at Northland College in Wisconsin. He has served as a reporter at Newsweek, associate director of the Institute of Journalism and Natural Resources and managing director of the University of Notre Dame's Environmental Change Initiative. He is the author of The Great Lakes Water Wars whose second edition was published in the fall of 2018. He continues to report on the 2018. This exhibition of basketry was created by generations of Anishinaabek basket makers. The baskets provide both practical use and artistic beauty. The exhibit title references the history of these baskets and the people who created and used them. The title also honors the partnership between the exhibition creators: the University of Michigan Museum of Anthropological Archaeology, Ziibiwing Center of Anishinabe Culture & Lifeways, Lisa Young (Lecturer, U-M Department of Anthropology) and students in the course Museum Anthropology (Anthro 497). This partnership was born from working with each other to repatriate our ancestors from the University of Michigan under the Native American Graves Protection and Repatriation Act.
