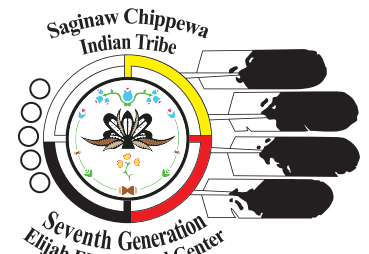

Ogimaawab is an Anishinaabe cultural mentor and storyteller dedicated to “leading the people in a good way.” With 10 years of experience in Native American behavioral health and a lifetime of traditional practice, he teaches the values of kendisowin (Indigenous knowledge) through song, seasonal ceremonies, and aadizookaan (storytelling). Based in the Great Lakes region, he currently focuses on recording Ojibwe elders and facilitating community events that promote healing through cultural immersion.
