WHAT YOU CAN DO?

- Tribal members can sign up for the Private Onsite Wastewater Treatment System Program (POWTS) to pump and inspect your septic tank at no charge.
- Failing, overflowing and/or nonexistent septic systems are contributing to a majority of the bacteria.
- It is not always apparent when a septic system is not functioning properly; thus, it is crucial to keep up with regular inspections and maintenance.
- Septic tanks should be pumped and inspected every 1-3 years.
- "Flushable" wipes are not flushable. Throw wipes in the trash.
