

## Grant-funded project to assist indigenous farmers with soil health sampling

project, newly-funded "Replenishing the Beings, the Soil Beneath our Feet," is working through a partnership with Michigan State University Extension and Michigan Inter-Tribal Land Grant Extension System (MILES) educators, community partners, technical assistance networks, U.S. Department of Agriculture staff and Natural Resources Conservation Service tribal liaisons to assist indigenous farmers with soil health sampling.

The project seeks to understand how soil health and indigenous farming practices interact and influence soils' capacity to grow food, enhance fertility and withstand weather extremes.

Currently, 15 farms have signed up and are actively participating in soil sampling throughout the State of Michigan. The rest of this publication can be found on: https://www.canr.msu.edu/ news/indigenous-farmersneeded-for-soil-health-testing.

The Saginaw Chippewa Tribal College would like to introduce Olivia Craig, the new MSU-Extension soil technician. Olivia is stationed at the SCTC's Land Grant Office in Mount Pleasant, Mich.



Olivia Craig, soil technician

Craig provided introduction:

"ъья! Му name is Olivia Craig; I am a member of the Cherokee Nation of Oklahoma but grew up in northern Nevada on Washoe territory. For college, I attended the University of California, Santa Barbara and earned a Bachelor of Science in environmental studies with an emphasis in ecology and evolutionary biology.

"During my time at UCSB I was highly involved with the American Indian Indigenous Students Association, where I served as a general officer. I was also a student facilitator for a traditional ecological knowledges lab course in the Environmental Studies



department, where I worked in a team of three to host a once-a-week class in one of our Indigenous managed garden spaces that highlighted relationship building with our more than human relatives. In addition to being in community on campus, I completed a senior thesis project with the local Chumash community that studied the effects of prescribed fire on Ku'w or Coast Live Oak, an important food species in the Santa Barbara region. All these experiences have developed my own connection to my Indigeneity and passion for supporting Indigenous food sovereignty through the use of local traditional knowledges."

The soil health of the land we occupy and cultivate food and plants from is critical to the way we survive as a nation. Healthy soils and traditional farming practices provide people with food security, supports biodiversity, preserve cultural traditions and climate resilience.

The one thing that is clear within Indigenous communities is that food is more than sustenance. It is our identity; it is our way of life, our language, and culture. Foods cultivated in healthy soils nourish both growers and consumers, fostering communities that thrive physically, mentally and spiritually. In addition, it nurtures a healthy biome within an ecosystem that supports the farmers' communities.

Much of Olivia Craig's work has been traveling to Indigenous farmlands and building a reciprocal relationship with tribal communities throughout upper and lower Michigan. When she isn't sampling soils in the lab and learning alongside Monica Jean, MSU-Extension agronomist and supervisor, she is working with the LGO team on their food sovereignty efforts. This program honors data sovereignty, and Craig does a good job at respecting this and building trusting communication







## Editorial: SCIT grandmother shares heartfelt message on Grandparents' Code

I haven't had my heart broken in a long time but when you can't see someone you love, it really has a negative effect on you. I'm talking about being kept from my grandchildren.

When it first happened, I sat around waiting for the other party to cool off for whatever slight that was

suffered this time. Then that they, too, were suffering. when days turned to months, I could not just sit around and do nothing while they were growing up. Not only was I being punished but so were my grandkids. They didn't know or understand why they couldn't see their grandmother, who they loved dearly.

I spoke to other Native grandparents to ease my burden but then only realized

That's when a fire was lit in my soul. It was time to take action and help this suffering. I started by calling several tribes across the country to see what they were doing to keep Native families together.

Traditionally, grandparents play a huge role in the upbringing of their grandchildren. They teach them, care for them, provide transportation, and play with them. All without having the "right" to do so. This had to be fixed and I may as well be the one to do it.

Once I received all the information I requested from these tribes, I took the best parts from each code and put together a rough draft as a starting point. Then this draft was presented to the Elders Advisory Board. They were very receptive and excited about this code. Some of them spoke about their own troubles and relieved themselves of their burdens.

The next meeting was with the Elders Advisory Board, Indian Child Welfare Committee members and the Legal department. We hashed out changes in the draft and forwarded it to Tribal Council. I was constantly in contact with Tribal Council making sure they didn't forget about it.

Finally, a year and a half later, we got the Grandparent Extended and Family Visitation Codes. To make sure everything went smoothly, I applied at Tribal Court, along with my son who was accommodating. I was asked some questions by Chief Judge Michele Horn and the whole thing took about ten minutes.

I am pleased to mention I now have a set schedule and know when they will be with me if my son ever decides to move out. For now, though, the Universe was good enough to give them to us fulltime. They keep the house lively and the holiday's fun. I really don't have time for anything else.

Even now when they are at school, it's too quiet. I want to thank everyone that was involved with the passing of these codes, we really made a difference in so many lives.

Please remember these codes are not just for grandparents; they are for aunties, uncles and pretty much any family members that are missing loved ones. We want to keep our Native families together like it's supposed to be. Now that you know... go get your babies!

## Tips for keeping safe in the winter

A senior's winter checklist includes prepping the home (heating, CO detectors, clear walkways), stocking an emergency kit (food, water, meds, batteries, flashlight, radio), ensuring warm clothing/layers, planning for power outages (backup heat, chargers), and focusing on fall prevention (nonslip mats, sturdy footwear, handrails) for safety and comfort.

#### Home safety and eating:

- Heating system: Get furnace/heating serviced; check insulation, windows, doors.
- Carbon monoxide (CO) detectors: Install/test near bedrooms.
- Fall prevention: Clear snow/ice from paths; use salt/sand; non-slip mats/shoes.
- •Lighting: Ensure good indoor lighting and easy access to flashlights.

## **Emergency preparedness kit**

- Food and water: Non-perishable items, water (several days' supply).
- Medications: Extra supply of prescriptions.
- Power outage items: Flashlights, extra batteries, battery-powered radio, portable phone charger.
- First aid: Fully stocked kit.
- Other: Whistle/bell, can opener, pet supplies if applicable.

## Health and comfort

- Clothing: Layers (sweaters, thermals, warm socks), hats, gloves, scarves, slippers.
- Hydration and nutrition: Encourage water, warm drinks; balanced meals.
- Mobility: Sturdy, slip-resistant shoes; use handrails/canes.

## Power outage plan

- Backup heat: Blankets, sleeping bags, or safe space heaters (with auto-shutoff).
- Medical equipment: Backup power source if needed.
- Communication: Fully charged cell phone, emergency contact list.

We are committed to serving the Saginaw Chippewa Indian Tribe of Michigan, the Great Lakes Anishinabek and the general public. Our commitment is demonstrated through our daily work and

our dedication is manifested through the advancement of our cultural identity for future generations. We are determined to represent the Saginaw Chippewa Indian Tribe of Michigan and the Ziibiwing Center to the highest ideals of our Tribe and organization. We are truly blessed to be keepers of the culture in our time. The Ziibiwing Center would like to thank the Saginaw Chippewa Indian Tribe of Michigan's Tribal Council, Tribal Administration, Tribal Departments and our families and friends for the support that we're blessed with each and every day.

## Accomplishments

- 10,644 visitors came to experience all the Center has to offer. An additional 2,333 people received educational services at 18 different offsite bookings by our staff. Onsite and offsite combined total 12,977 visitors for FY2025.
- Ziibiwing hosted 122 tours totaling 3,864 people and 119 events with 4,675 people in attendance for combined special events, and cultural programs for the Tribal community and the general public.
- The ZCS maintains seven Tribal Cemeteries, including Baseline Cemetery (Isabella & Union Townships, Isabella County), Flint Stone Street Cemetery (Flint Township, Genesee County), Mission Creek Cemetery (Union Township, Isabella County), Nibokaan Cemetery (Chippewa Township, Isabella County), Nippinsing Cemetery (Isabella Township, Isabella County), Nottawa Cemetery (Nottawa Township, Isabella County), Swartz Creek Cemetery (Gaines Township, Genesee County), in addition to the Ziibiwing Center's three-acre lawn (14.41 acres per week).
- The Association of Tribal Archives, Libraries, and Museums honored the Ziibiwing Center with its Community Impact Award. This international award is given for the ZC's Reclaiming the Narrative: Harvesting and Digitizing the U.S. Indian Industrial Boarding School Records project. The Community Impact Award recognizes the Ziibiwing Center for its commitment to community engagement, innovation, and overall excellence.
- Ziibiwing conducted NAGPRA consultations with City of Detroit, Dayton Society of Natural History, Detroit Institute of Arts, Marshall University, Michigan Department of Natural History, Michigan History Center, Michigan State Historic Preservation Office, Michigan State Police -Diamondale, Michigan, Michigan State University, Ohio History Connection, Peabody Museum of Archaeology & Ethnology, University of Michigan, University of Toledo, and Vassar College.
- The THPO completed 171 cultural resource reviews. These reviews are required under Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act and protect the cultural resources/ traditional cultural properties of the Saginaw Chippewa Indian Tribe of Michigan. In addition to the completion of the cultural resource reviews, the Tribal Historic Preservation Officer participated in 23 activities/events, two out of state, five hosted at the Ziibiwing Center, six presentations about MIIBS, three at the MIIBS location, multiple conferences and updates to the ZC Board of Directors.
- Through generous support from NATHPO and per our five-Year Strategic Plan and building staff capacity, we hired parttime THPO interns, India Perez and Gage Colwell.

- Eva Collins served as a Cultural Resource Management Intern through CMU's Museum Studies Program
- Awarded six of nine grants submitted in FY25 include:
  - 1) US Department of Treasury-\$102,558
  - 2) NATHPO FY25 Grant- \$5,870
  - 3) ATALM Community Impact Award Grant- \$2,478
  - 4) NPS NAGPRA Repatriation Grant-\$19,480.77
  - 5) Mt. Pleasant Area Community Foundation Grant- \$18,720
  - 6) National Park Service HPF THPO FY25 Grant-\$110,761, \$259,867.77 (total)
  - 7) Max & Victoria Dreyfus Foundation-\$19,999.42 (pending)
  - 8) ACLS Fellowship Grant- \$60,000 (pending)
  - 9) LEO State Grant-\$999,999.99 (not awarded) Other grant funding in FY25 available to spend from previously awarded grants was \$250,949.58, for a combined total
- There were approximately 46,446 individual contacts made by our team, including physical visits, phone calls, and emails. Ziibiwing also maintains a social media presence on Facebook.
- The Research Center served 1,325 in-person visits for research related activity and/or guidance.
- Marcella Hadden (THPO) is the Chairwoman of the MIIBS Committee, and provides leadership for the Architecture and MIIBS Website Committees.
- Anita Heard (Research Center Coordinator) serves on the Saginaw Chippewa Data Governance Board and is a member of the Society of American Archivists.
- William Johnson (Curator and Operations Manager) serves on the Michigan Anishinaabek Cultural Preservation & Repatriation Alliance (MACPRA), serving his fourth consecutive four-year term as Chairman and the University Michigan's Advisory Committee on Culturally Unidentifiable Human Remains under NAGPRA (since 2011).
- Charla Riley, Funding & Development Specialist, serves on the Anishinabe Language Revitalization Committee.
- Noelle Wells, Administrative Assistant II, serves on the Saginaw Chippewa Indian Tribe of Michigan's Powwow Committee.
- ZC Gift Shop sales totaled \$188,028.42 for FY2025. The Gift Shop continues to liquidate old merchandise and increase merchandise selections from Indigenous vendors and Indigenous artists.
- Grant funding provided salary and fringe for Digitization Specialist, Mindy Bailey for full-time employment at the Ziibiwing Center.
- ZC held its first Summer Concert Paid Parking Fundraiser raising \$4,875. Proceeds are being used to replace the carpet in our discussion rooms.


